GREETING Alleluia! Christ is risen!

Christ is risen indeed. Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. **And also with you.**

PRAYER OF THE DAY Almighty and eternal God, the strength of those who believe and the hope of those who doubt, may we, who have not seen, have faith in you and receive the fullness of Christ's blessing, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

FIRST READING Acts 2:14a, 22-32

After the Holy Spirit comes to the apostles on Pentecost, Peter preaches the gospel to the gathered crowd. He tells them that Jesus, who obediently went to his death according to God's plan, was raised from the dead by God. Finally, he appeals to scripture, quoting Psalm 16:8-11, to show that Jesus is the Messiah: though crucified, the risen Jesus is now enthroned.

^{14a}Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed [the crowd],

²²"You that are Israelites, listen to what I have to say: Jesus of Nazareth, a man attested to you by God with deeds of power, wonders, and signs that God did through him among you, as you yourselves know—²³this man, handed over to you according to the definite plan and foreknowledge of God, you crucified and killed by the hands of those outside the law. ²⁴But God raised him up, having freed him from death, because it was impossible for him to be held in its power.

²⁵For David says concerning him, 'I saw the Lord always before me, for he is at my right hand so that I will not be shaken; ²⁶therefore my heart was glad, and my tongue rejoiced; moreover my flesh will live in hope. ²⁷For you will not abandon my soul to Hades, or let your Holy One experience corruption. ²⁸You have made known to me the ways of life; you will make me full of gladness with your presence.'

²⁹"Fellow Israelites, I may say to you confidently of our ancestor David that he both died and was buried, and his tomb is with us to this day. ³⁰Since he was a prophet, he knew that God had sworn with an oath to him that he would put one of his descendants on his throne.

³¹Foreseeing this, David spoke of the resurrection of the Messiah, saying, 'He was not abandoned to Hades, nor did his flesh experience corruption.' ³²This Jesus God raised up, and of that all of us are witnesses."

PSALM: Psalm 16

¹Protect me, O God, for I take refuge in you;

I have said to the LORD, "You are my Lord, my good above all other."

²All my delight is in the godly that are in the land, upon those who are noble among the people.

³But those who run after other gods shall have their troubles multiplied.

⁷I will bless the LORD who gives me counsel; my heart teaches me night after night.


⁸I have set the LORD always before me;


because God is at my right hand, I shall not be shaken.

GOSPEL: John 20:19-31

The risen Jesus appears to his disciples, offering them a benediction, a commission, and the gift of the Holy Spirit. But one of their number is missing, and his unbelief prompts another visit from the Lord.

¹⁹When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁰After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. ²¹Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." ²²When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

²⁴But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. ²⁵So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

²⁶A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁷Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." ²⁸Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" ²⁹Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

³⁰Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. ³¹But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

REFLECTION

PRAYER: God of all times and places, you call your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us. Amen. ¹

TEXT: A week ago, in our individual homes and in our individual ways, we celebrated the joys, the new life, the resurrection of Easter.

The story continues today in the gospel of John. In the story, the characters are still in the midst of the Easter miracle, the Easter discoveries.

Some of them are still living in the fear, anxiety, and grief of the crucifixion. That's where we find the disciples, gathered behind locked doors, in fear.

In conversation (on our adjoining lawns) yesterday, I found my next-door neighbor echoing that same attitude of fear. He was not cowering behind locked doors. Instead, his fear shows in his trepidation in visiting the grocery store: the mask, the cleanser, the gloves, the X's on the floor to keep 6' of distance from other shoppers. He's having a hard time living in this altered reality.

Jesus entered that room with the disciples in spite of their locks, in spite of their fear. Jesus enters our rooms today – in spite of our fear, in support of the love we hold for our neighbors.

That is where we begin together today. Whether we wear our masks in fear of the virus, or in love for our neighbor, Jesus is with us today. Jesus says to us "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When Jesus says this to us, he breathes on us and says "Receive the Holy Spirit".

That was the experience, on that first Easter day, for 10 of the disciples. But Thomas was absent from that locked room. Thomas was the steadfast one who had urged the others to follow Jesus to the tomb of Lazarus, and on into Jerusalem. Yet, in this text today, in this visit from Jesus, Thomas was absent.

In my imaginings about this day, I see Thomas refusing the locked doors, and the fear. I see Thomas out and about, listening to the conversations on the street, checking the local news, scoping out ears and hearts eager to hear how the disciples will carry on the work of Jesus.

When Thomas returns to that locked room, I imagine his shock when he hears that Jesus has been in their midst. Imagine the questions in his mind: Jesus came here? But why not with <u>me</u> while I'm risking my life outside?

While I reject the negative label of "doubting Thomas", I can certainly see the anger, the frustration, and the challenge of Thomas to those in that locked room.

In many ways, I believe we are experiencing those same feelings along with Thomas: anger, frustration, and challenge. In the same way that Jesus came to Thomas in answer to his questions, Jesus comes, today, to us as well.

When Jesus comes, that second time, to the disciples and Thomas, it is Jesus who applies the word "doubt" to the myriad emotions that Thomas is carrying.

So, what about doubt? Is doubt a negative reaction? What role does doubt play in our lives of faith?

Doubt and faith are not opposites. If our faith is to grow, it travels with doubt, testing, testing, testing. As Christians we find that the more we travel in faith, the less we know for certain. To live as a Christian is to live with ambiguity, uncertainty – and doubt.

Faith and doubt travel as a necessary duet. Faith without doubt will yield a stagnant, inactive faith. Faith will keep doubt from dumping you into cynicism and despair. In turn, doubt will keep our faith from evolving into certainty, smugness and death.

Today, living in these new and challenging times, we live with Thomas and his questions. Even as Jesus responded to Thomas, so Jesus is with us and all of our faith and relationship questions.

Jesus enters into our lives when we least expect him, offers peace, gifts us with the breath of the Holy Spirit and sends us out to tell the story.

Jesus blesses all who struggle with their questions of faith. Jesus blesses all who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

The Christian faith is the only world religion that takes as its logo an emphatic symbol of death, the cross. And yet the central affirmation of Christianity is hopeful life. Jesus just keeps appearing -- again and again -- to unlock the barriers between faith and doubt, between life and death, between past and future, between fear and joy. Jesus keeps appearing, a dependable reminder of our relationship with our dependable God. That is the strength and the comfort in which we live, today, tomorrow and into eternity. Amen.
